**Reports for Annual Parish Meeting** 

Wednesday 1st May 2024

#### **BEMBRIDGE VILLAGE HALL**

Bembridge Village Hall has been at the heart of village life and the centre of activities for many long-standing village organisations including the Art Society, the Horticultural Society, The Friendship Circle, Wight Island Players, the Heritage Society and Bembridge Little Theatre Club to name but a few. There are also regular art classes, dance classes, speech and drama classes, fund raising table top sales, coffee mornings and art exhibitions. More recently a regular Craft Fair has been established, and the founding of a Gilbert and Sullivan production company two years ago has added a new genre to the hall's excellent theatrical output with annual productions of a G & S operetta and an annual carol concert at Christmas time, supplementing the annual pantomime from Wight Island Players and plays from Bembridge Little Theatre Club.

The running of the hall is managed as a charitable trust by a committee consisting of 4 members who are elected annually, together with a number of co-opted members who can offer expertise to assist with running the hall such as maintenance, electrical work, compliance with health and safety regulations and utility supply management. All committee members are registered as trustees.

Over the years there have been a number of alterations and improvements made and the latest include new wi-fi, blue tooth sound system and upgrading of the kitchen facilities in both halls. Bembridge Little Theatre Club have also upgraded and modernised their theatre lighting rig.

The Committee has also recently purchased new chairs for the back hall and will be installing new curtains in the hall including new stage curtains later this year. Cleaning and upgrading of the stage area is also planned.

All of this means that the hall is developing a reputation as a go to venue for parties, wakes, one-off performances etc. as well as the more regular users outlined above.



## Bembridge Youth & Community Centre Report 2023/2024

Another full year at the Bembridge Youth & Community Centre. Classes are held during the day and evening every day in the week. These are Dance Fitness, Burlesque Chair Dance, Art Group, Karate, Line dancing, Tai Chi and Petanque. Also, the WI hold meetings once a month. All ages are welcome.

We are welcoming Alzheimer Café, starting in June, once a month and a weekly class Keep Active Move More Class in May.

At the moment we have 7 Bembridge Youth Football teams who train on Saturdays and compete on Sunday mornings. Two more teams train and have friendly matches. Bembridge Adult Football have 3 teams.

To raise money for the Bembridge Youth & Community Centre Bryan Jones our chairman organises two runs a year. The Trail 5 in the summer and runners compete for trophies and medal. In December is the Soup Run, which is for fun, and runners receive a mug and a big Christmas Raffle and this only possible due to the generosity of local businesses. We have over 100 runners for each event and is growing every year.

Other fund-raising events are Quiz nights held in the lounge bar. Firework night which was unfortunately cancelled due to the weather.

The Bembridge Youth & Community Centre is available for private hire. We have had a number of children's parties, wedding reception Christening, adult birthday parties of all ages etc.

Bembridge School run a stop off station for the annual Randonnee cycle event using the hall and kitchen. And raising funds for the school. Bembridge Parish Council have their annual Community Chest event in the hall.

We look forward to another successful year and providing a facility that is available to the local community and all areas across the island.

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### **Bembridge Heritage Report 2024**

With grateful thanks to our loyal members who total 218, it has enabled us to attract approximately 600 visitors a year to our Heritage Centre in Weavers Yard. A rota system is used with the help of volunteers to staff our limited opening hours. Also we have and continue to host either a coffee morning or lecture event on alternate months The coffee mornings provide refreshments and opportunities to purchase local books and to access or huge data base detailing historical and local information. The event lectures are very popular wide-ranging subjects from the island's early history through wartime to present day.

We partake in major village events such as the annual Bembridge fair, royal events and other celebrations.

A constant today is history and can never be changed. Unfortunately, documentation can be lost so we see it as an obligation to continue to act as custodians to preserve our history of our wonderful and unique village for future generations.

We welcome new members and volunteers who can help us.

# Bembridge Community Library report from 01/04/23 to 31/03/24

For the last couple of years the library has been responsible for the total running of the library as well as the maintenance of the building. Given the lack of attention to the building over the previous decades, when the Isle of Wight council were responsible, there have been many challenges in getting the building 'into shape'. Of particular concern is what to do with the 'rear extension' which was previously used by Bembridge Heritage (BH). When BH, quite rightly, moved out due to ongoing damp and space issues, the library was compelled to reluctantly take over responsibility for the rear of the building. However, the library has no specific need for this space apart from accessing the toilet. Nevertheless, the Trustees agreed to spend £2k on filling in the large hole in the floor left by the removal of the Pluto engine. Further thought about what to do next and a builder's quote for repairs convinced us that the best course of action might be for the extension to be demolished and rebuilt. To this end talks have started with BH to see if this can be done using grants etc as BH would prefer a central location in the Village to their current industrial unit. Watch this space to see what happens next!

Last April a small group from Men in Sheds obtained and upcycled a new kitchen. The old kitchen was probably installed in the 1950's so the upgrade is a huge improvement for the volunteers. Further contracted work is scheduled for 2024-25 to improve the Community room.

The library hosts events for others so the 2nd Bembridge Rainbow unit had an evening in the library and the library hosted an exhibition for the IOW Photographic Society. A children's craft event run by an Isle of Wight author was hosted in the library. The library's community room was also used by Age UK as a contact place for their information.

We now have regular 'author of the month' promotions and were pleased to work with BH to promote a book written by a local author.

In terms of presenting itself to the community, the library was fully involved with the annual Bembridge Street Fair and had a table at a BH coffee morning. Our annual Easter Coffee Morning and Christmas Coffee Morning and Raffle events took place as usual and were well attended, raising vital funds to help keep the library open. Also to help raise funds a representative from the library attended the annual Community Chest event and was successful in obtaining funding for a new A3 laminator which is now available for use.

Library volunteers visited the local schools to inform the children about the Summer Reading Challenge which took place over the summer holidays. The library also supported a colouring competition on behalf of World Animal Day. In March this year we hosted a visit from the local pre-school.

Bembridge library is open from 9.30am to 12.30pm on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday mornings plus Friday afternoons from 1.30pm to 4.30pm. As well as offering access to the whole of the Isle of Wight library book catalogue our services include:

- Book and jigsaw sales
- Photocopying
- Printing
- Laminating (A4 & A3)
- Tourist point for tourists and local events
- A large community room for hire
- The free use of public computers
- Computer lessons (1-2-1)
- General information on services across the Isle of Wight

The library welcomes donations as well as unwanted books and puzzles.

Update April 2024

Our activities over the past year (April 23 to March 24) can be broadly categorised into three groups i.e. helping others, raising funds and social activities. Highlighting the main activities under these headings we have:

Under helping others, we made 2 refectory tables for Newport Minster and Holy Trinity Bembridge (HTB) using old pew seats. Also for HTB we renewed 3 signs for the Cloisters plus refurbished an umbrella stand, replaced the flower shelves, made 12 candle holders and installed a camera stand.

We built and located a Toy Library at Paddock drive for general use and will reinstall it later this year for the warmer months. Bembridge Primary School got 2 new benches made from old Windmill stocks wood and 3 storage boxes for external use.

For the Parish we refurbished the Village Hall signs, rebuilt the #8 Culver Trail sign and made and installed 5 new memorial apple tree plaques at the cemetery.

In order to raise funds we made a few bespoke items for local residents including several high level garden planters, a dog training gate, table lamps and a bird feeder refurbishment. We also received some income from Newport Minster for making items using old pew wood which the Minster then put on sale to help pay for the Newport Minster refurbishment which should complete soon.

A generous donation from HTB was gratefully received for the work we had done for the church, although all we had asked for was reimbursement of our actual costs. We also were successful at the Community Chest event in getting 50% funding for a new electric cutter.

On the social side we held a summer BBQ and a Christmas meal as usual. Also, now regular events, were 10 pin bowling in Ryde, pitch and putt golf at Browns and grass bowls at Sandown. The members got into pancake making on Shrove Tuesday, had a walk followed by lunch at the Harbour View cafe and had an 'open gardens' visit. New to this past year we've been running a photographic competition on subjects as diverse as 'Beaches' and 'Expressions'.

Highlights of the year were visits to the East Cowes and then Poole lifeboat building operations. These tours of the facilities were expertly led by RNLI volunteers and the inclement weather in Poole added context to the challenging role of the RNLI. We also went over to the updated Mary Rose exhibition in Portsmouth, another excellent trip.

#### Windmills Annual Report 23-24

Windmills Preschool has been at the heart of the Bembridge community for several decades; 2023 saw the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our incorporation as a limited company and a not-for-profit educational charity but the preschool had a childcare legacy in the village for many years prior to this date. Windmills continues to provide a nurturing environment combining quality childcare with a varied Early Years curriculum for children aged 2 to 4 & following our most recent Ofsted inspection in June 2023, continues to be graded consistently "Good" in all areas of provision. Our close links with Bembridge Primary school help to give the children a smooth transition across to Reception after preschool.

The preschool remains committed to supporting families in the community and operates an open-door policy for all our families; this year the preschool became an Early Help Champion working closely with The Family Hub in Ryde (Barnardo's) to ensure all children have the best opportunities to thrive by identifying needs, triaging & signposting to various interventions provided locally. As part of our ongoing diverse curriculum which is specifically tailored each week to meet the needs of the children in setting, our normal enrichment activities continue; visits from the children to our intergenerational friends at Inver House, outings to the park & beach, visits to the RNLI boat house & to the local village library help to give the children a real sense of their community & the world around them. Our end of term graduation in July 23 for our school ready children saw the sunny preschool garden host a wonderful family celebration with the presentation of books & gifts to the children by the Primary school headteacher.

The preschool operates as a not-for-profit voluntary director run professional educational establishment. We are in receipt of government funding which is dependent on the number of children attending each term. This funding partially covers the costs of employing a fully qualified, experienced staff team; we have been grateful for the financial support of the BPC throughout the years, most recently for a Community Chest grant from the BPC towards a new front gate which has enhanced our new front garden environment. The annual opportunity to bid for monies from the BPC allows the preschool to purchase resources for the children that it would otherwise be unable to fund.

As we approach the final term of this academic year, the preschool is full to its capacity of 28 children per day, with 47 children on roll. We have a busy curriculum planned exploring science, the natural world, beach & forest school, our wonderful bodies, life cycles & our world, as well as offering additional school readiness groups for our older children focussing on speech & language, mark making & preparations for the exciting new chapter which is "big" school! We are pleased to report that the coming year looks equally as busy.

Windmills staff team are always happy to welcome members of our community to our mobile classroom & value the ongoing support shown by the village.

2023 was a highly successful year for all areas of the RNLI Guild, with record takings in our shop, record numbers visiting the boathouse and record donations. In the summer, our weekly public launches have gained in popularity and we frequently welcome 'full houses' on these occasions. We also ran weekly children's activity mornings during the main summer holiday period and these were well attended by visitors and locals alike.

As we move into the RNLI's highly anticipated bicentenary year, we expect 2024 to be even busier. It has started already, with a special gathering of 200 extremely resilient children from our Primary School and Ryde Prep School on our walkway on a very cold day in early March and the signing of the national scroll as it came to our station two weeks later.

We are now looking forward to the rest of the events planned for our special year. In the week of the May half term, there will be a range of activities both locally and at the Inshore Lifeboat Centre in East Cowes. Here in Bembridge, we will, as ever, be out in force at the Street Fair, providing lifejacket advice at our Inshore boathouse, welcoming children for special activities in the Offshore boathouse and throwing wellington boots for fun on the beach (always highly competitive!) The highlight of the week will be the public launch of our all-weather boat one evening, followed by a sausage sizzle in the Inshore boathouse. Plans are also afoot for a very special Open Day on 24<sup>th</sup> August, to which everyone will be most welcome.

Currently we have nearly 100 members of our Guild, whose activities range from fundraising to volunteering in the shop, to welcoming visitors to the boathouse and providing water safety advice. New members are always welcome.

During the 2023/24 season we have had 7 teams training year round and participating in the IoW Sunday League from u7 up to U15 level equating to c130 young people in and around the village. In addition, we've continued to nurture young players with our Mini Kickers sessions on Saturday mornings and support social teams helping to champion and build girls participation in the game.

In March, 30 children from the village were lucky enough to take part in an inspiring trip to St.Georges Park – the home of England Football – a trip that will live long in the memory!

The Club has recently been successful in applying for much needed grant funding for a pair of new Futsal goals which will help more children to participate in football in indoor facilities particularly during the winter when so many training sessions and games are called off due to waterlogged or frozen pitches.

The club has continued to invest in its thriving volunteer base to develop coaching, safeguarding and first aid related skills. We are delighted to announce Bembridge Youth FC was recently awarded England Accredited Club Status confirming it as an accessible, safe and sustainable club dedicated to quality standards of youth football development: See County Press Article

### Bembridge Houseboat Owners Association

## Report 2023/24

This past year has been a quieter one for us as a group.

We have had one derelict boat removed, in line with all the standards for environmental and bird protection of the area met. A replacement will be put in this summer with some changes to the sea wall as recommended by the Environment Agency.

Another boat Rijnstroom, was replaced by St Vincent.

We have had an active campaign on road safety along the Embankment, productively joining with the Parish Council. This resulted in a meeting with the Hants and IOW crime commissioner, the establishment of a speed check group, the possible purchase of equipment to help speed checks, the presence of police speed checks, the cutting back of overgrown plants on the footpath and various proposals to establish further speed controls.

We have resolved the issues we had with the routing of the proposed bridleway along the old railway line. This facilitated the finalising of that path route and hopefully the reopening of it at the Southern (Bembridge) end. Despite assurances, this is taking longer than anticipated. As far as we know, the funding was agreed by the IOW council and all it needed was the signing off of the legal papers by the harbour owners. We have been assured this has now been done and has been back with the council for a while. It needs chasing again.

Members of the association have been instrumental in the campaign to establish a visitor centre, bird hides and nature walk on the Harbour Farm site opposite us. The site is currently owned by the Environment Agency. This gained a huge amount of public support culminating in a great deal of positive press coverage and a demonstration of 60 + people.

Our efforts gained the promise from the EA of a public consultation after the summer. We are still awaiting a promised letter from the Parish Council (promised at the January meeting) indicating whether they support the proposal or not and whether they would support the idea of hosting a public forum on the matter. We have worked more productively with the EA over their proposals for repairs to the embankment, shoring up our flood defences. Surveys have shown repairs are very much needed. This year's recent spring tide, saw the highest levels anyone has ever seen, with water half way across the road at dustbin corner. If one was needed, this signals that flood defence work (ie raising the height of the Embankment), instead of repairs, will be needed as soon as possible.

We have worked on reducing pollution in the harbour, being hit on the one hand, by thousands of hours of discharge from the river, the incoming tide bringing additional sea discharges in and some boats without treatment plants in the harbour. Attempts to get the harbour water tested and obtain a liability to get something done if tests fail have so far been unsuccessful, oddly meeting some local opposition. It is hoped work with the council's Sustainability Group may enable some testing in the future.

Talks with Southern Water have reassured us works at the Roud treatment plant, one of the worst offenders, should reduce outflows there. Given their sewer storm overflow spilled 127 times for a total of 2,026.51 hours last year this is welcome news. However, the biggest offender is our local St Helens one with 142 spills for a total of 2,613.96 hours. Add in the other 10 sewage outfalls along the river and you see the problem.

The Harbour has repeated their aim of paying for treatment plants on the few houseboats still without one (this came about from an original clause in our leases that had sewage plans in them that were never enacted), but this offer is conditional upon new houseboat plots being agreed and none are even proposed. There is a concern that other houseboats elsewhere in the harbour that do have treatment plants do not have the ability to empty them as they are too far away from the road.
